





PROJECT LIFESAVER

Senior Project Lifesaver Fact Sheet

The Program

Project Lifesaver is a program designed to help individuals with Alzheimer's or dementia who may wander or get lost. Project Lifesaver uses state-of-the-art technology, employing wristband transmitters to locate wandering and lost adults. It is now being used in all 50 states, Canada and Australia.

The Bracelet

Individuals who are part of the Project Lifesaver program wear a personalized bracelet that emits a locating signal. The bracelet is a one-ounce battery-operated radio transmitter that produces an automatic locating signal every second, 24 hours a day. The signal can be traced on the ground or in the air up to 8-10 several miles. The bracelet is water resistant and can be worn in the bath, shower, pool, etc. It is made out of very strong plastic material that is difficult to remove without the use of scissors.

Search and Rescue

After caregivers call 911, their local police department will be dispatched to the area to begin the search for the missing person. Westchester County Police will also be dispatched to the area to search with a mobile locator receiver system. As each bracelet has a unique radio frequency, the Project Lifesaver search team is able to positively locate and identify the missing person, reducing search times from hours and days to minutes.

Eligibility for Project Lifesaver

Adults who are eligible for Project Lifesaver through the Westchester County Initiative, which provides the program **free of charge**, must meet the following **requirements:**

- ✓ Have a diagnosis of Alzheimer's or other form of dementia
- ✓ Have a history of wandering or elopement
- ✓ Live in the community with a primary caregiver who provides daily, ongoing care 24/7/365
- ✓ Both caregiver and care-receiver must reside in Westchester County
- ✓ Transmitters will be placed with clients ONLY at the request of a legally responsible party, either a spouse or family member with Power of Attorney/Court Order, and can provide a copy to WJCS

Families' Responsibilities

Trained PLS staff will work cooperatively with families to ensure that their loved one's bracelet is safe and effective. Families must agree to:

- ✓ Test their loved one's bracelet on a daily basis & record their tests in a log provided by WJCS
- ✓ Attend all battery change appointments with PLS staff every 60 days at WJCS or any of the battery changing sites throughout Westchester County

- Have a history of wandering or elopement
- Live in the community with a primary caregiver who provides daily, ongoing care (no residential facilities or group homes)
- Reside in Westchester County

Families' Responsibilities

Trained WJCS staff will work cooperatively with families to ensure that their child's bracelet is safe and effective. Families will:


- · Check their child's bracelet on a daily basis and record their checks in the log provided by WJCS
- Attend all battery change appointments with WJCS staff every 60 days
- Pay a \$325 fee for the initial year of membership and usage, \$85 fee every year after.

Westchester



This free program uses radio-frequency technology to find seniors who wander and safely return them home. It works through bracelets with special batteries the seniors wear on their wrists. Should someone become lost, specially trained and equipped county police officers can locate them by tracking a radio signal the bracelets transmit.

To be eligible a senior must:

- Live in Westchester County
- Be dependent upon the person they live with
- · Have a tendency to wander

Funded through the United States Department of Health and Human Services-Administration on Community Living (ACL), the New York State Office for the Aging, and the Westchester County Department of Senior Programs and Services.

Este es un programa gratuito que usa tecnología de frecuencia radial para encontrar a personas de edad avanzada que suelen vagar ayudándolos de una manera segura a regresar a su hogar. Funciona por medio del uso de una pulsera que contiene baterías especiales que la persona de edad avanzada usa en la muñeca. En caso de que alguien se extravíe oficiales de la policía especialmente entrenados pueden ubicar a la persona rastreando la frecuencia radial que la pulsera emite.

Para cualificar en este programa la persona de la tercera edad deberá:

- · Vivir en el Condado de Westchester
- Depender de la persona con la que vive
- Tener tendencia a vagar o deambular
